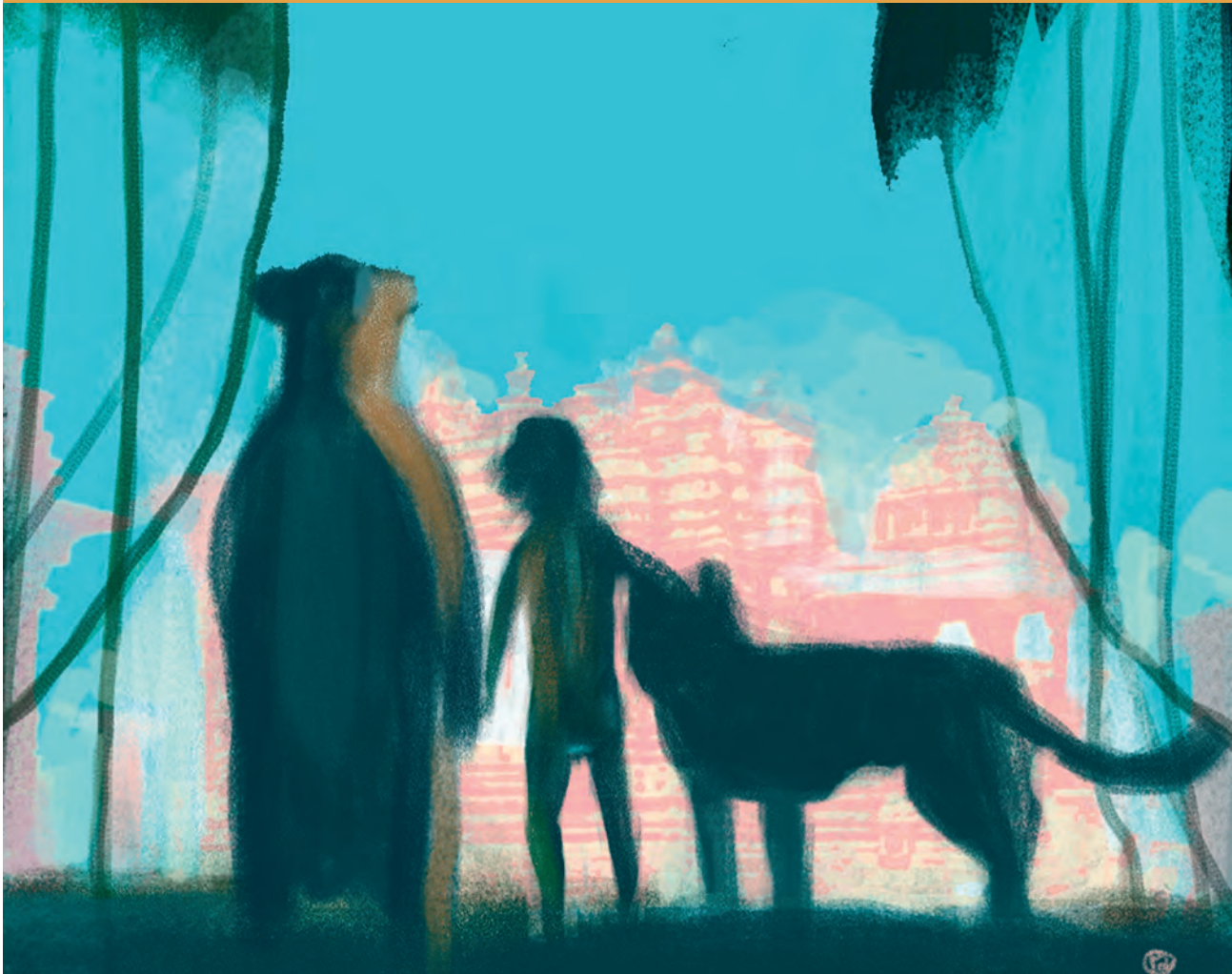

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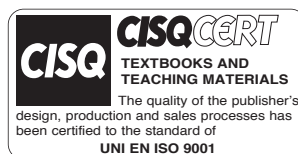

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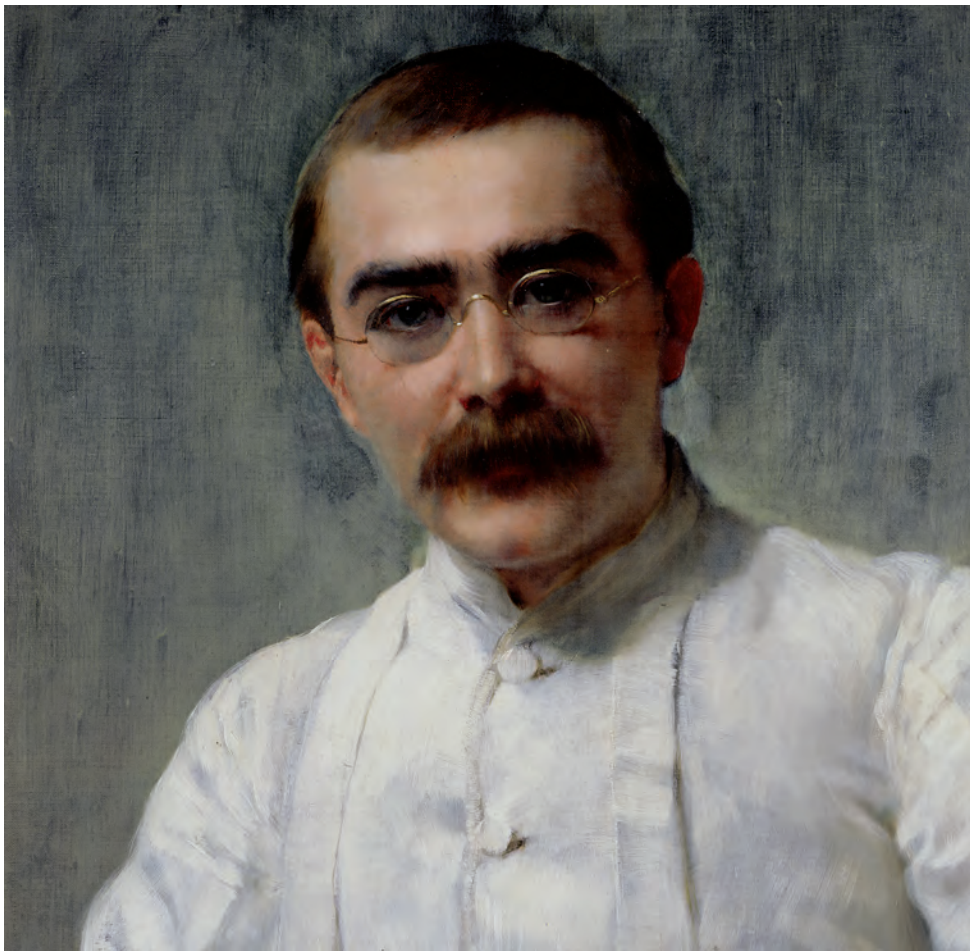

CHAPTER ONE

Mowgli's Family

One evening in the hills of south India, Father Wolf  wakes up. Mother Wolf is near him with four little cubs. 'It's time to look for food,' says Father Wolf. He gets up and leaves the cave. There is a big moon in the sky.

'Hello!' says a voice. It is the jackal Tabaqui. He eats everything, even old clothes from the villages. The wolves do not like him and are afraid of him.

'What do you want, Tabaqui?' asks Father Wolf.

'The tiger Shere Khan is coming here to look for food,' says Tabaqui.

'What!' says Father Wolf, surprised. 'He can't do that. He must tell us first because that's the Law of the Jungle.'

'Shere Khan has a bad leg and he can't run fast,' says Mother Wolf. 'He only kills bulls, and the people of the village are angry with him. That's why he's coming here. He wants to start hunting¹ in a new place.'

'Listen!' says Tabaqui. 'You can hear him in the woods.'

1. **hunting** : killing animals for food.

THE JUNGLE BOOK

Father Wolf listens and says, 'What a stupid animal! He's making a lot of noise and all the animals are going to run away and hide. How can I look for food now?'

'Shhh,' says Mother Wolf. 'It's the noise of a... man!'

'A man!' cries Father Wolf.

The Law of the Jungle says that animals must not eat man, because then a lot of men with guns¹ come to the jungle. And all of the animals are in danger.

'Listen!' says Mother Wolf. 'Something's coming to the cave.'

Father Wolf sees a baby standing under a tree. The baby looks at Father Wolf and laughs.

'Is that a man cub?' asks Mother Wolf. 'Bring it here; I want to look at it.'

The baby is small and has no clothes. Father Wolf gently carries it to Mother Wolf. It starts drinking her milk with the other cubs.

Mother Wolf is happy and says, 'Look, he's drinking my milk with the cubs. He's not afraid.'

It is suddenly dark in the cave because Shere Khan puts his big head inside.

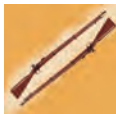
'We're pleased to see you, Shere Khan,' says Father Wolf, but his eyes are angry.

'I know there's a man cub here,' says Shere Khan. 'It's mine! You must give it to me!'

'Shere Khan's very big so he can't come into the cave,' thinks Father Wolf.

'The man cub is ours,' says Father Wolf. 'The leader of the pack's going to decide what to do with the cub. We listen to him and not to a tiger.'

1. guns :







‘The man cub is mine!’ cries Shere Khan angrily. He starts roaring.¹

‘No!’ cries Mother Wolf. ‘The man cub is mine and you can’t kill him. He’s going to live with us. He’s my son! Now go away!’

Shere Khan walks around the cave slowly and looks at the man cub.

‘No, I’m Shere Khan, and the cub is mine.’

‘You’re wrong,’ says Mother Wolf. ‘The man cub is ours. He’s going to live with us. He’s my son! Now go away, Shere Khan.’

Father Wolf is surprised, but he knows Mother Wolf is brave² and strong.

1. **roaring** : making the sound tigers make.

2. **brave** : not afraid.



Shere Khan goes away. He knows he cannot fight ¹ Mother Wolf in the cave. 'One day I'm going to have that cub!' he cries.

After Shere Khan leaves, Father Wolf says, 'Do you really want to keep him?'

'Yes, I do,' says Mother Wolf. 'He isn't afraid of us and he's happy here. I want to call him Mowgli the frog.'

'Mowgli?' says Father Wolf. 'Yes, I like the name Mowgli. We must show Mowgli to the pack.'

The Law of the Jungle says that the pack must see all of the wolf cubs when they can walk, and look at them carefully.

1. **fight** : when people or animals fight, they use physical force to hurt each other.

These are the possessive pronouns:

mine	ours
yours	yours
his/hers	theirs

*Is that your cub? Yes, It's **ours**.*

NOT: *Yes, it's our cub.*

*I've got my umbrella. Have you got **yours**?*

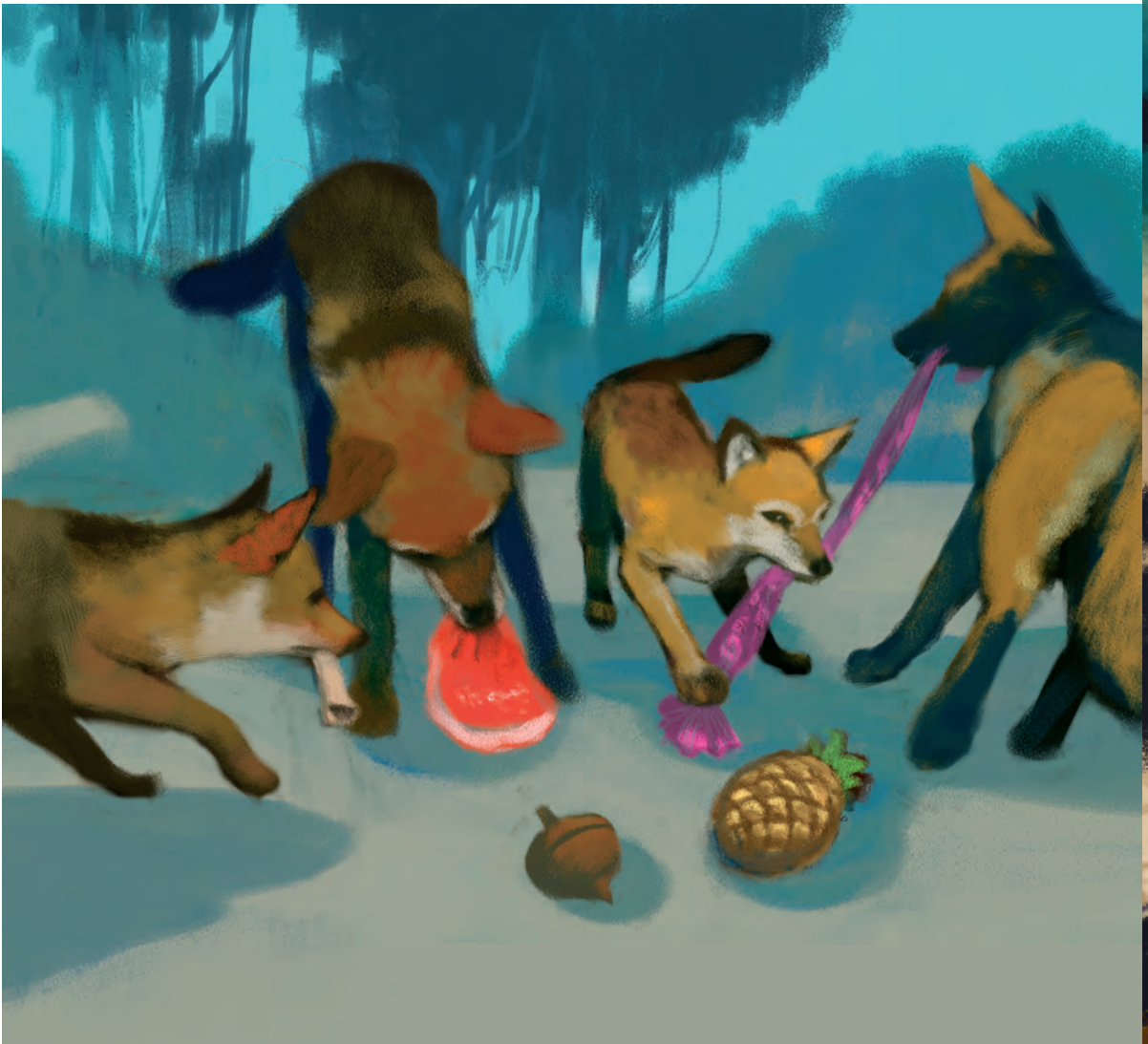
NOT: *Have you got your umbrella?*

*I like my new clothes. I don't like **hers**.*

NOT: *I don't like her new clothes.*

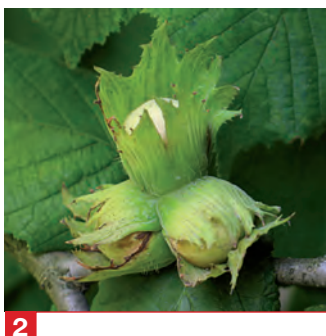

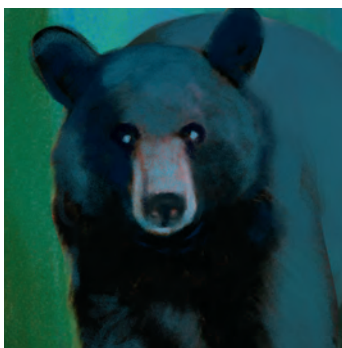
