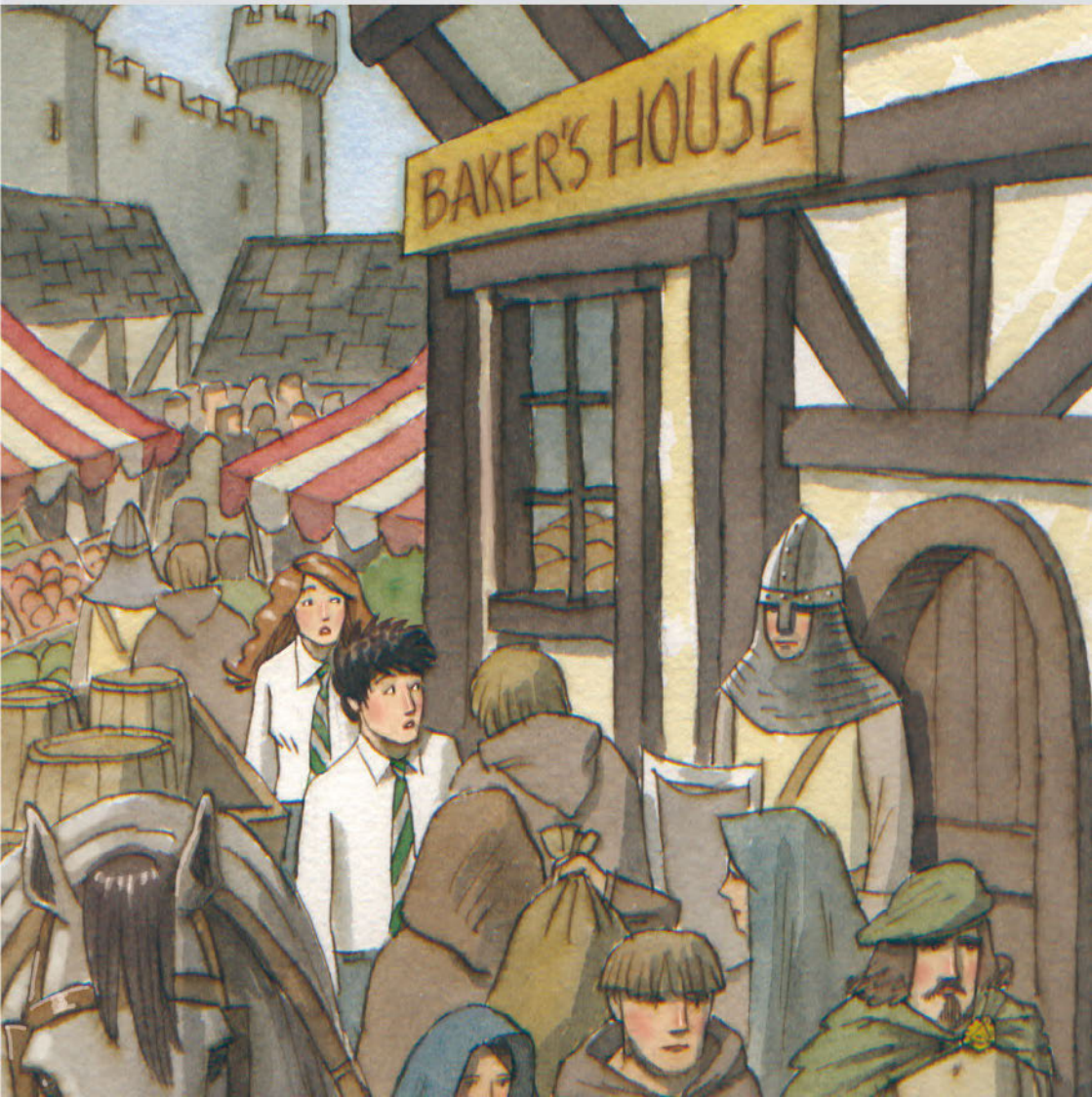

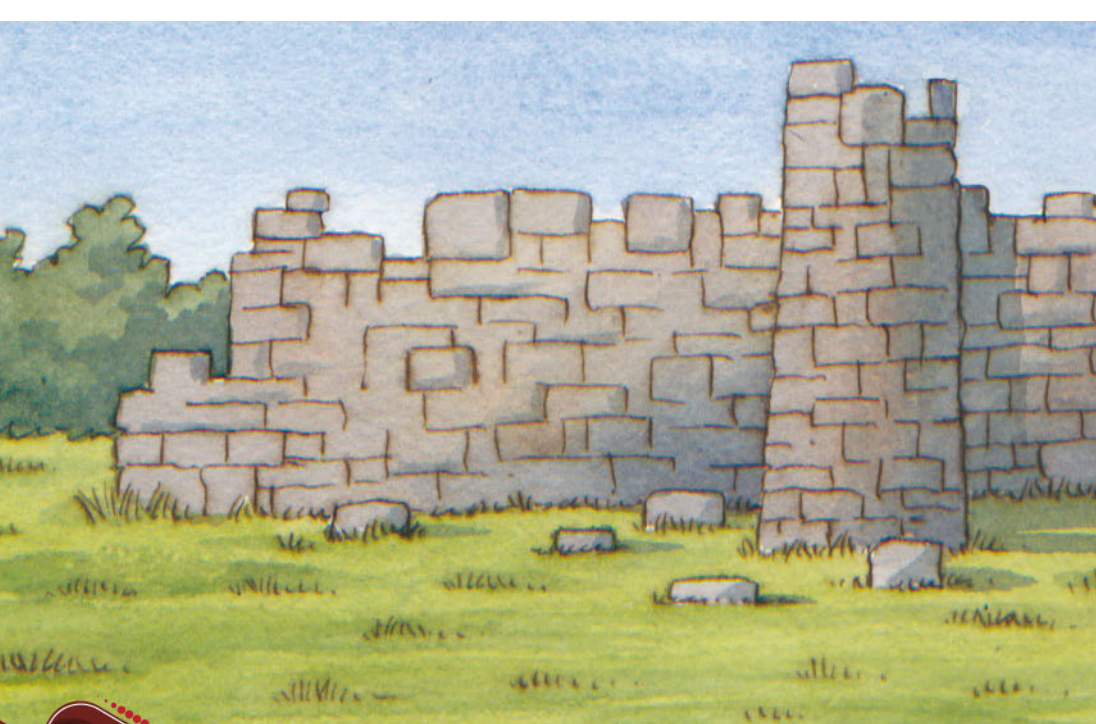

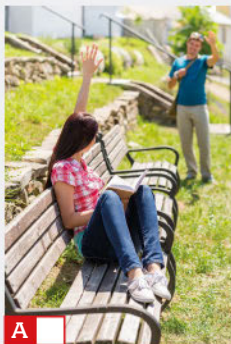
3 Adam's World

Here are some examples of direct speech in Chapter One. Look how they are transformed into indirect speech.

Direct speech

Indirect Speech

"Dinner **is** ready."

→ Lucy said that dinner **was** ready.

"**I'm** coming."

→ He said that he **was** coming.

"The family **is** ready to eat."

→ She said that the family **was** ready to eat.

We have to move the verb tenses one step backwards to change the sentence into indirect, or reported, speech. The present simple changes to the past simple in indirect speech. Look at these other examples and note how the verb tenses change.

"I **will** come down when

He said he **would** come

I **have finished**."

→ down when he **had finished**.

→ He said that Jack **could** run fast.

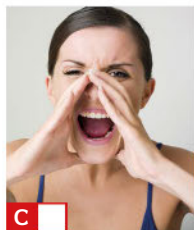
