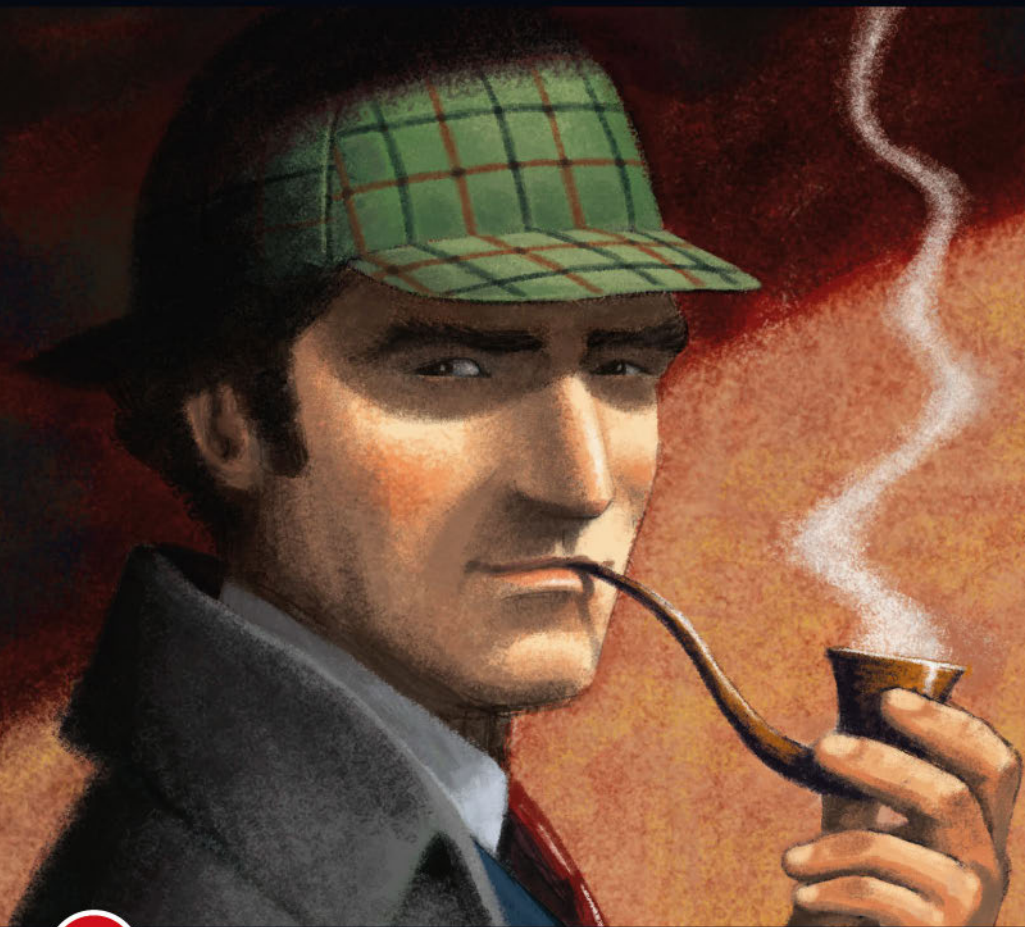

About the author

Sir Arthur Conan Doyle is the creator of one of the world's most famous and popular detectives, **Sherlock Holmes**.

Conan Doyle was born in **Edinburgh**, Scotland, on 22 May 1859. His mother introduced him to books when he was still a young boy, and he always loved reading. In 1876 he began studying medicine at Edinburgh University. One of his professors was Dr Joseph Bell, who surprised his students because he often knew a lot about his patients simply by looking at them. He was a careful observer of detail, and later he became Conan Doyle's model for Sherlock Holmes.

Conan Doyle became a doctor in 1882 and opened his first practice. However, he did not have many patients so he began writing his first Sherlock Holmes story, *A Study in Scarlet* (1887). The story was a great success.

In 1891 the monthly magazine *The Strand* asked Conan Doyle to write six Sherlock Holmes stories. The clever detective and his friend **Dr Watson** soon became very popular in Great Britain.

However, Conan Doyle did not want to be famous *only* for his Sherlock Holmes stories. He wanted to be popular for his historical novels. So, in 1893 he wrote a story called *The Final Problem* and 'killed' Holmes. Conan Doyle's readers (including his mother!) were very angry, and *The Strand* lost about 20,000 readers.

Finally, in 1901 Conan Doyle decided to write another Sherlock Holmes adventure, a novel called *The Hound of the Baskervilles*. His readers were very pleased and he continued writing about the famous detective until 1927.

Conan Doyle's wonderful stories have been translated into sixty languages, and there have been many films, plays, and television programmes about Sherlock Holmes and his exciting adventures.

Some famous Sherlock Holmes books are *The Sign of Four* (1890), *The Adventures of Sherlock Holmes* (1892), *The Return of Sherlock Holmes* (1905), *The Valley of Fear* (1915) and *The Case-Book of Sherlock Holmes* (1927).

Sir Arthur Conan Doyle died in England on 7 July 1930.

How did Sherlock Holmes and *Dr Watson become friends?*

Sherlock Holmes did not have much money when he moved to London in 1874. In 1881 he decided to share the rent of his rooms at **221B Baker Street** with **Dr John H. Watson**, and this is how they became good friends.

Dr Watson tells us many interesting and funny things about his friend, Sherlock Holmes. He tells us that he is a **quiet person** with regular habits, and is an easy person to live with. He usually goes to bed around ten at night and gets up very early in the morning.

Watson also tells us that **he is untidy** and his desk is always covered with papers. He likes difficult cases and when he works on them he has a lot of energy. But sometimes he gets bored and sits in the living room and does nothing. We know that Holmes **plays the violin** well, and often uses **chemistry equipment** to solve cases. He is one of the first detectives to use scientific methods – called forensic methods – such as microscopes, fingerprints, ¹ footprints, ² photographs and studies of handwriting (see page 64).

Watson and Holmes have a housekeeper, Mrs Hudson, who cooks and cleans for them. After a few years, however, Watson gets married and goes to live in another part of London. But they continue to work together.

Conan Doyle did not invent the address – the house at 221B Baker Street really exists! Today that house is *The Sherlock Holmes Museum*, which thousands of people visit every year.
